

KING CHARLES III's CORONATION



A weekend of celebrations marked the King Charles III's Coronation, with a bank holiday weekend from Saturday 6 May to Monday 8 May. King Charles III is married to Camilla and has two sons, Prince William and Prince Harry. King Charles is the 40th British Monarch, also the King of another 55 countries known as the Commonwealth. Camilla is now known as the Queen Camilla.

On Saturday 6 May, there was the Coronation service where King Charles III was crowned in Westminster Abbey. On Sunday 7 May, there was a Big Coronation Lunch, street parties, community lunches, a concert, which was broadcasted on BBC One, featuring contemporary stars such as Freya Ridings, accompanied by an iconic legend, Katy Perry. It also featured a choir picked from the NHS, refugee choirs and deaf-signing singers. Light shows were also displayed at Windsor Castle. On Monday 8 May, there was an extra bank holiday where people were encouraged to volunteer for the big help out.

The Coronation dish was announced as a quiche; a dish that people could cook at home, involving themselves in the Coronation Lunch on the 7th of May.

Landmarks across the UK were lit up using projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations. For those who were not able to see it in person, it was shown on a big screen in St. James's Park, Green Park and Hyde Park in London and was broadcasted live on BBC One, BBC iPlayer, BBC Radio 2 and BBC Sounds. People who didn't have a ticket for the concert on Sunday 7 May were encouraged to have street parties and local get-togethers for the Coronation Big Lunch. The Palace was expecting events to take place in streets, gardens and parks in every corner of the UK, with neighbours and communities being invited to share food and fun together, just as it was for The Platinum Jubilee for the Queen in June.

Despite being interrupted by a short downpour, the day was packed with bliss and was an unforgettable experience. Hari, a Year 6 pupil, said that the highlight of his day was "Wearing my own clothes and playing outside."

There were members of the Armed Forces from the Commonwealth and the United Kingdom, alongside The Sovereign's Bodyguard and Royal Watermen. Undoubtedly, the most memorable moment of the day was the crowning of King Charles and Queen Camilla. The moment the crown was placed on King Charles' head, there were three cheers for his Majesty which could be heard from the grounds of Buckingham Palace, the spectators on the Mall and those celebrating in the Royal Parks. The joyous cheers were deafening and it was amazing being surrounded by the public all excitedly cheering and frantically waving their flags.


We hope you had a brilliant time marking the Coronation with your family and friends. We are looking forward to the next historic event that we can share with our families and we hope you are too.



Year 6's trip to The Houses of Parliament

Last week, the Year 6's were lucky enough to travel into London and visit the Houses of Parliament. We set off early from school and briskly walked to Watford Metropolitan station, where we caught the tube to Finchley Road. Once we got to Finchley road, we changed over to the Jubilee line and travelled to Westminster station. It was so exciting coming out of the station, and seeing Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament.

We walked over to the Education centre, where we were given our visitor passes and then began our tour. We were handed a headset and a receiver, so that we could hear the guide. During the day, we learnt about the two Houses in Parliament, The House of Commons and The House of Lords. Did you know that the Houses of Parliament was bombed on 10th May 1941, and as we walked past the buildings we could see the damage caused by the bombs. The House of Commons was completely destroyed and the House of Lords, Westminster Hall and Big Ben were damaged.

We visited the Strangers Gallery in the House of Lords first and could see the chamber, where the members were discussing and debating. We learnt that many years ago most of the members of this House were nobles, or people born into the upper classes and many of them inherited their position. Today, the members of the House of Lords are people who have expertise in a variety of subjects including education, sports, science and the arts. The knowledge they gain from their careers helps them in their work in parliament. The House of Lords is responsible for making new laws (legislation), checking the work of the government (scrutiny), and debating current issues. It was fascinating listening to the Lord Speaker and seeing the golden throne, where King Charles will sit at the State Opening of Parliament.

We then visited the gallery in The House of Commons, where there was a heated debate taking place. The House of Commons is an elected body consisting of 650 members known as members of Parliament (MPs). It was interesting to learn that in the House of Commons the seats are green and in the House of Lords they are red.

Next, we visited Westminster Hall, which is the oldest part of the Houses of Parliament and is over 900 years old. It is believed that when Henry VIII lived at the palace he used to play tennis in the hall. Two tennis balls were found by workmen in the hall's rafters in 1920. It was incredible to stand where Henry VIII once stood.

After this we had a workshop, in the education centre, where we learnt all about how to make a new law. Poplar class had their own debate about banning smoking and Rowan class debated about having a three day weekend. It was interesting to hear different viewpoints.

After lunch, our local MP, Mr Dean Russell came and spent some time with us. He told us all about his role in the House of Commons, the new law that he has been responsible for and we also had a question and answer session with him. The trip was great fun and a very informative and interesting visit. We all had a brilliant time and learnt a lot about this historic place.

SENSATIONAL STRAWBERRY LIME MOCKTAIL

Strawberry, mint, lime, and Sprite make this virgin Strawberry recipe one worth repeating!

Prep time: 10 MINS **Total time:** 10 MINS

Servings: 4

Ingredients:

• 12-14 Strawberries, stems removed

- 8 Large mint leaves
- 2 1/2 cups Sprite
- 1/8 cup Fresh lime juice

Garnish:

- Mint leaves
- Lime slices

Instructions:

- Add strawberries and mint leaves to a jug.
- Using a muddle (or a wooden spoon), muddle the strawberries and mint leaves. You're basically crushing strawberries and mint leaves to extract the juices. Be careful as you don't want to tear the mint leaves to pieces.
- Add the lime juice and Sprite to the jug then stir.
- Fill glasses with crushed ice (optional). Pour the virgin mixture over the ice. Garnish with extra mint and lime slices. Serve immediately.



MAGNIFICIENT MANGO MOCKTAIL

A tropical twist on the mojito cocktail, the mango mojito mixes mangos, freshly squeezed lime juice, fresh mint leaves, and club soda for a non-alcoholic family-friendly summer beverage.

Prep Time: 10m

Servings: 2

Ingredients:

• 2 tablespoons extra fine granulated sugar

- 2 tablespoons fresh squeezed lime juice
- 10 mint leaves
- 3 tablespoons mango puree (fresh mango, pureed in blender)
- 1/2 cup lemonade

Instructions:

- In a large glass or container add sugar, lime juice, mint leaves and mango puree.
- Using the back of a spoon crush mint leaves to release scent and flavour, about 1 minute.
- Add lemonade and combine.
- Pour over glasses filled with ice and serve.

For optimum flavour use fresh lime juice
